### FROM THE MANSE

### Dear Friends

I heard recently of a church which has raised two thousand pounds in order to host an 'open doors' Christmas lunch for anybody in the parish who would otherwise be alone or in need on Christmas day — whether young or old, man or woman, housed or homeless, whether Christian or not. It struck me that this is a kind of 'radical' hospitality — welcoming all comers, and giving freely of time and money required — that properly reflects the love of God revealed in Jesus Christ.

Particularly at Christmas-time, when so much emphasis is put on 'family' gathering together to celebrate, we should be aware that for some people this is a time of year when for one reason or another, they feel lonely, or excluded, or homesick. There will be families, too, who will likely struggle to provide food, let alone presents, for their children.

Which makes me think of the Christmas story, and the journey of the young Mary with Joseph from their home in Nazareth to Bethlehem; of Mary, about to give birth to their first child, arriving in the unfamiliar place, unable to find a room anywhere. What might they have thought and felt, so far from home, among strangers, anxious about the coming birth, that first Christmas?

We know how the story goes – space was found for them in the byre, sheltering in the warmth of the straw among the animals, and the birth went well: but it might have gone very differently, and been much more difficult. The young parents were dependent on the good will and compassion of others – which is to say, that Jesus himself was too, as God was born among us, weak and vulnerable.

In Stirling this year there will be many – students, travellers, and also asylum-seekers, who find themselves alone at Christmas, and I wonder what we can do as churches, to offer a welcome, show hospitality, and remind people of the God who came to the world in the infant Christ, to those whose needs are greater than ours, that His light may shine clear in the mid-winter darkness of all our lives.

### Notes From the Session Clerk

The clocks have just gone back an hour, and with it a realisation that winter is fast approaching. Perhaps hastened by our wonderful summer, the autumn colours are spectacular. Our very recent Harvest Thanksgiving Service was greatly enhanced by the singing provided by Viewfield Young Church during a shared Service, and all the proceeds were donated to Start Up Stirling, both in cash and in kind.

It has been an eventful few months for the Church. Our Minister became suddenly unwell and was admitted to Hospital; we are delighted that he is making good progress, and is hopefully returning to us in early November. During the past 2 months or so , we have been fortunate to have pulpit supply especially from Reverends Dennis Rose and Maggie Roderick, and also Derek Neilson and we are grateful to them for their help. I must also mention Dr Lesley Stanley who arrived on the day of Alan's illness as an OLM Candidate and, at very short notice, did an amazing job!

During the past few months, the Church has welcomed even more visitors than 2017, up by 6.2% and amazing total of more than 68,000! Our thanks must once again go to the Convener of the Friends, Ann Crawford, the Secretary, Brian Morrison, and to the whole Ministry of Welcome Team for coping so ably with this number. The donations to the Friends of the Church are literally life saving and have enabled payment by the Friends of the massive energy and insurance accounts, and also in other tangible ways such as the redecoration of the Angel (Children's) Room; our very sincere thanks for this also.

A considerable number of visitors also attended Sunday worship; recently a group of 38 Americans who travelled from Mull to attend. In August we held a special Baptismal Service, during which there was an actual baptism, and to which we invited children who have been previously baptised by Alan Miller. This was well attended, hospitality was laid on by the Social Committee, and we feel that this is well worth repeating.

In September, we hosted the opening reception and nomination of the winner of the Mcilvenney Prize at the Scottish Crimewriters' Festival Weekend. Around 300 people attended, and an elaborate sound and lighting system was installed, including very effective red outside floodlighting. All went very well, and they have asked to return next year!

Regarding the Church's future, there have been 3 meetings organised by Presbytery to discuss the future of the 4 City Centre Churches. The outcome and the decisions made by presbytery are now awaited. Regarding the Holy Rude, and as mentioned previously, the Property Committee of the Kirk Session, is about to publish a short discussion paper to include facts gathered from a recent questionnaire.

In the near future, we are once again hosting the City Armistice Service, and as it is the Centenary of the end of WW1, will include celebratory bell ringing. In the run up to Christmas, we are also delighted to once again welcome back the Stirling University Christian Union Carol Concert, which last year saw over 100 young students attend.

My sincere best wishes to you and to all your families for a happy and peaceful yuletide season.

### FRIENDS OF THE CHURCH OF THE HOLY RUDE

This Society was registered as a Charity (No. SC042326) in May 2011 with the main purpose of raising funds for the care and maintenance of Holy Rude. Other principal objectives are a) the adornment and furnishing of the Church and providing facilities for the benefit of the Congregation and visitors, b) supporting the performance of music in Holy Rude, and c) the encouragement of research into the history of the Church.

### **Friends 2018 Annual General Meeting**

The Annual General Meeting of the Friends Society was held on Sunday 16th. September in Church of the Holy Rude. Treasurer, Alastair Roy, presented to the Members the Annual Report and Accounts for the year 2017/18, and also reported on the very significant assistance that had been provided to Holy Rude by the Friends since the Society was established in 2011.

The Annual Report and Accounts were then adopted by the Members. By the 3 year rotation of Council Members, Margaret Davidson and Mike Makower, stood down from the Friends Council, and in their place, Janet McNair and Ian Boulter were elected as Members Nominees.

After the meeting refreshments were served in the South East Aisle.

### **Record Ministry of Welcome Season**

The Ministry of Welcome Season that had begun on 1st. May, finally drew to a close on 30th. September, and the annual meeting of the team of volunteers was then held on 16th. October in Holy Rude, when the results for the 23 week season were announced.

*Visitor Numbers* for the 23 week season reached the record high number of 68,803 which was up by nearly 4,000 (6.2%) over the 2017 season of 64,809. The busiest month was August when approx. 21,000 visitors were welcomed into Holy Rude.

The Visitors Books were signed by people from 84 different countries of the world, and the biggest number came from North America. Comments given in the books were very complimentary and demonstrated that Holy Rude has a very special appeal.

Shop Sales were very healthy with an increased range of items for sale, and the Candles and Prayer Request Cards in St. Andrew's Chapel again proved to be very popular.

The *donations* received from visitors are the major source of income to the Friends, and this year totalled approx. £32,000 gross. With a major repair programme of work required on the church, this money is crucial too.

### **Volunteers**

Sincere thanks go to the team of 32 volunteers for giving their time so willingly and ensuring that Holy Rude was open every day over the summer months, and for sharing the history and heritage of our ancient church with the many visitors.

As always, additional volunteers are required for next summer, so if you know of any relations or friends who may be interested in taking part in the Ministry of Welcome, please get in touch.

### WARNING......WARNING: ADVENT VIRUS

### Be on the alert for symptoms of inner HOPE, PEACE, JOY and LOVE.



### Cannons and Colours - Part 2



In the Autumn Newsletter information was given about the 2 Cannons that overlook the Cowane's Hospital Bowling Green, and how they were captured by the British Army from the Russians in 1855 at the Siege of Sevastopol during the Crimean War. It was also stated that research was taking place into the local legend that prior to the war these guns were made by Carron Company, Falkirk, and sold to the Russians.

The above photograph shows how the cannons would have looked prior to be placed on the stone plinths at the Bowling Green.

In September a visitor to Holy Rude, with a special interest in military history, was intrigued to learn that the Colours of the Scots Guards above the Choir Stalls showed Sevastopol, and that two cannons captured at the same battle were positioned at the Bowling Green. It transpired he was an ex-employee of the Royal Armouries, Leeds, and after learning of the possibility of the cannons being manufactured by Carron Company, he undertook to investigate and verify where the guns were actually made.

After taking various photographs and details of the cannon barrels and trunnions, he sent the information to his friend, a Curator Emeritus of Royal Armouries, and who is one of Britain's leading experts on this type of artillery. A very detailed response was then received confirming that the cannons were indeed of Russian manufacture, and not by Carron Company.

With a bore of 7 inches, and a length of 9 feet, the cannons were identified as 36 pounder guns, made around 1851, with an effective range estimated to be 2000 - 2200 yards.

### **Carron Company Link**

In the research a link between Carron Company and Russia was identified, however, as in the 1780's the Russian authorities recognised the need to improve the production and quality of their weapons foundries, and so a contract for a large quantity of cutting-edge plant and equipment was placed with Carron Company. The contract was handled by Charles Gascoigne, Managing Partner of Carron, and in May 1786 he sailed, along with 12 Carron workmen, to Russia to supervise the installation work at Aleksandrovsky Foundry in Kronstadt.

At that time Gascoigne was in financial trouble, having been declared bankrupt, and he was never to return to Scotland, remaining in Russia until his death 20 years later in 1806. In that period he enjoyed a very successful career and improved many existing Russian iron foundries and built new ones, also advancing the Russian's cannon-manufacturing techniques. It is considered probable that he influenced the processes of manufacture, rather than the design, of the cannons at the Bowling Green.

### IN THE BLEAK MID-WINTER



This is a favourite carol at Christmas. It describes one of our poorer winters when Jesus was born. Christina Rossetti wrote this song which was brought back to modern use in the 1950 edition of Hymns Ancient and Modern Christina Rossetti, in full Christina Georgina Rossetti, pseudonym Ellen Alleyne was born Dec. 5, 1830, in London . She died Dec. 29, 1894, in London. As one of the most important of English women poets both in range and quality, she excelled in works of fantasy, in poems for children, and in religious poetry.

Christina was the youngest child of Gabriele Rossetti and was the sister of the painter-poet Dante Gabriel Rossetti. In 1847 her grandfather, Gaetano Polidori, printed on his private press a volume of her Verses, in which signs of poetic talent are already visible. In 1850, under the pseudonym Ellen Alleyne, she contributed seven poems to the Pre-Raphaelite journal The Germ. In 1853, when the Rossetti family was in financial difficulties, Christina helped her mother keep a school at Frome, Somerset, but it was not a success, and in 1854 the pair returned to London, where Christina's father died, in straitened circumstances. Christina entered on her life work of companionship to her mother, devotion to her religion, and the writing of her poetry. In 1871 Christina was stricken by Graves' disease, a thyroid disorder that marred her appearance and left her life in danger. She accepted her affliction with courage and resignation, sustained by religious faith, and she continued to publish. The transience of material things is a theme that recurs throughout her poetry, and the resigned but passionate sadness of unhappy love is often a dominant note in her writing

#### IN THE BLEAK MID-WINTER

In the bleak mid-winter frosty wind made moan. Earth stood hard as iron, water like a stone: Snow had fallen snow on snow, snow on snow. In the bleak mid-winter Long ago.

Our God earth cannot hold Him nor earth sustain: Heaven and earth shall flee away when he comes to reign. In the bleak mid-winter a stable place sufficed The Lord God Almighty —- Jesus Christ.

Enough for him whom cherubim worship night and day, A breast full of milk and a manger full of hay. Enough for him, whom angels fall down before, The ox and ass and camel which adore.

Angels and archangels may have gathered there.
Cherubim and seraphim thronged the air:
But only his mother in her maiden bliss
Worshipped the beloved with a kiss.

What can I give him poor as I am.
If I were a shepherd I would bring a lamb,


