FROM THE MANSE

Dear Friends,

In June it was my privilege to attend the bi-annual *Evanelisches Kirchentag* in Dortmund as a guest of the Protestant Church of Westphalia. The Kirchentag is a gathering of Christians from all over Germany, and from different Protestant traditions to worship, learn. Sing and celebrate together.

Held for the first time in 1947, as Germany still lay in ruins after the war, the Kirchentag was to be a sign of unity and peace in the war's aftermath, a sign for the country and the world of a determination never to return to the evils and catastrophe of the Nazi past, and instead to place the German churches at the heart of the process of building a new country in friendship and solidarity.

The Dortmund Kirchentag was the 47th to be held, and even in today's secular climate, it was quite astonishing to see the numbers of people who travel from far and wide, from with Germany and from many other countries, to come together in Christian fellowship. The opening worship closed a major citycentre cross-road on a busy Thursday, and drew a crowd of about a hundred thousand people who filled the surrounding streets. The closing worship was held in the stadium of Borussia Dortmund (Germany's largest football ground).

Particularly remarkable were the comparatively large numbers of young people, church youth groups and other youth organisations, many of them members of the brass bands that are a major feature of the music at the Kirchentag. Also present were many influential politicians and other celebrities – the President of Germany addressed the opening worship, and the Chancellor, Angela Merkl, addressed a large crowd of thirty thousand on the Saturday morning: evidence if required that the German churches are still seen as a key part of modern German society.

It was, all in all, an inspiring experience: lively, creative, inspirational and thought-provoking. Wouldn't it be great if we could draw the same kind of crowds, and offer the same kind of engagement with society, here in Scotland, in partnership with all the Churches? Yes, it would, but I think we would need to rediscover at least some of the confidence that so clearly underpins the life of many in the German churches; a confidence in the message of the gospel, confidence in the goodness and love of God; confidence in our place in our country, but above all, confidence in ourselves as a people called by God to live, serve, and celebrate the life of faith that enlivens the whole world.

The reading aloud of the Bible over the summer has been well received by visitors and thanks are due to our readers.

Work continues at Cowane's Hospital and not unexpectedly, this has uncovered issues which has delayed the expected completion date. It is now hoped that work will be finished at the end of October.

The cafe, which previously was sited in Cowane's, has provided a welcome facility within the church. Marion, who runs the cafe, has also sourced new cleaners for us following the retiral of Susan who was with us for many years. Thanks Marion!

Organ Appeal

Update - August 2019

Fundraising for the organ Appeal has been ongoing throughout the year. We have now raised just short of £96,000, a fantastic achievement considering the vast amount of money the congregation also has to raise to keep the fabric of the church in good condition.

We continue to have faults occurring at various times, which I have managed to work around. However, we have had some damage to the organ caused by the flash flooding that Stirling saw at the end of June. There has been some water ingress into the blowing chamber underneath the crossing floor, just in front of the organ case. Fortunately the electric motor and Discus blowing unit appear to be OK. The 6 monthly service visit for the blower takes place in a few weeks time, which hopefully will confirm that. The damage has been done to some bellows in the chamber that regulate the wind supply from the blower to the organ. The leatherwork on the bellows has begun to leak air as the animal glue used to stick the leather to the frame has degraded with contact with the water. This has had a temporary 'fix' so the organ can still be in use, but we are waiting for the quote from the organ builders for re-leathering of these bellows.



THE CORONATION ANNIVERSARY LECTURE



Those who attended the Coronation Anniversary Lecture on July 29th enjoyed a fascinating illustrated talk on The Honours of Scotland, delivered by Mr. Charles Burnett, a Scottish Antiquarian and former Officer of Arms. The Honours of Scotland consist of the Scottish Crown, Sceptre and Sword and were used at the coronation of King James VI in the Church of the Holy Rude on 29th July, 1567.

Mr. Burnett treated the audience to an erudite and engrossing account of the Honours, explaining the story of their origins and the various events in their history. The Honours date back to the 15th and 16th centuries and are the oldest surviving set of crown jewels in the British Isles. They were first used together at the coronation of Mary Queen of Scots in 1543. The Crown was made in Scotland. The Sceptre and the Sword were both made in Italy and were presented as gifts to king James IV, by Pope Alexander VI in 1491 and by Pope Julius II in 1507. They have had an adventurous history and have required repairs and embellishment on various occasions. In the 17th century Cromwell's troops attempted to seize them and melt them down, as they had done to the English crown jewels, but they were saved by being hidden under the floor of Kinneff Parish Church. They were later locked away in a chest in Edinburgh Castle and remained forgotten for more than a century until Sir Walter Scott rediscovered them in 1818. They are now on display to the public in a secure room in Edinburgh Castle.

We are greatly indebted to Charles Burnett for his excellent presentation and his account of the role of The Church of the Holy Rude in the history of The Honours of Scotland.

Holy Rude Benefactor - Colonel Andrew Ramsay Bain M.C. D.L. (1892 - 1976)

In the summer Newsletter information was given on John Risk, who was a major benefactor to Holy Rude, and who was a member of the Holy Rude Restoration Committee formed in 1936. Another member of this committee was Colonel Andrew Ramsay Bain, and who in his will left a substantial bequest of £132,000 for the repair and maintenance of Holy Rude, and which led to the establishing in 2011 of the registered charity *Friends of the Church of the Holy Rude*.

In 2012, local nurses also benefited from a £60,000 legacy from him when the money was used to buy 3,000 Fob Watches for distribution to every registered and unregistered nurse in the NHS Forth Valley area, and to pay for travel scholarships and training.

Andrew Bain was born in 1893 near Slamannan, where his father was a Colliery Manager. In 1910 after the family had moved to The Whins, 34 Park Terrace, Stirling, (this was to be his home for the rest of his life), Andrew went to Glasgow University to study Engineering, where he proved to be a top student and graduated as BSc in 1913.

In 1914 on the outbreak of war, he enlisted with the 7th. Battalion of the Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders, and then served in France and Flanders. He was mentioned three times in Despatches, before as a Lieutenant he was awarded the Military Cross for gallantry in December 1917. He remained in the Army, and rose to be Colonel and Commanding Officer of the Battalion, retiring in 1929 at the age of 37.

He continued his active support for the Army through membership of the Territorial Army Association, but returned to civilian life to pursue a successful career as a Company Director and a notable public figure in Stirling.

Among Andrew Bain's community commitments was the management of The William Simpson Home in Plean, founded in 1832 for the social care of exservicemen. He was also a Provincial Grand Master of Stirlingshire, a Past Master of Lodge Ancient Stirling No. 30, and President of the Stirling District and County Savings Bank. To these he added in 1957 the title of Honorary Sheriff Substitute.

Andrew Ramsay Bain never married, and died in Stirling at the age of 83, after a long and active career in military and public service. His grave is in the New Monkland Cemetery, situated in the village of Glenmavis, near Airdrie.

2019 Ministry of Welcome Season

The 2019 Ministry of Welcome Season began on Good Friday 19th. April, and up until 10th. August a total of 44,531 visitors had been welcomed into Holy Rude, and this is up by some 2,304 (5.2%) over last year at this time. All indications are that we are likely to exceed 70,000 visitors for the full season, and this would be an all time record number for Holy Rude.

Again, visitors have been attracted from all parts of the world and amongst the Guided Tours given there have been groups from New Mexico, Alabama and California in the USA, as well as Finland and Thailand.

Assistance has also been given to a number of visitors seeking to find ancestors' graves in the Old Town Cemeteries.
