Dear Friends,

It does seem entirely appropriate that we celebrate Advent and Christmas in the depths of winter, and that as the days shorten and nights lengthen, we look to light up our homes and towns with lights that dispel the gloom.

In all the uncertainties of life – and we are still caught up in many uncertainties at this time, in the church, in the world, and in the life of the nation – let us be the ones who remember what God has done, and who God is, and how God came to us, and bear the light of love and hope into all the places we are present, and to all the people we meet on the way.

With every blessing for a peaceful, joyful and blessed Advent and Christmas.

FROM THE DIRECTOR OF MUSIC



Organ Appeal

Update - November 2019

In the last edition of the Newsletter I wrote about the major problem we had experienced due to ingress of water in the blowing chamber. This had the result of damaging the leather on the concussion bellows due to contact of water on the glue that held the leather to the ribs of the bellows, and making the leather itself harden.

The bellows were removed and taken to the organ builder's workshop for the work to be undertaken. Fortunately, the organ could still be used whilst the work was undertaken. The only difference that you might have noticed was that the full organ could not be used, it could only be played at a subdued level. The work took about five weeks to complete and cost £12,360 When the bellows were reinstated the grand sound of the full organ could once again fill the Holy Rude. We were lucky to be able to make an insurance claim for the work undertaken, which was accepted and paid, minus our insurance excess.

At the end of October the 6 monthly service of the blower took place, everything is in good order and the water ingress doesn't appear to have damaged the motor or the blowing unit.



This picture shows the concussion bellows behind the blower. You can see the nice new white leather on the 3 bellows. Also, the frame that holds the bellows in place has been refurbished.

Further updates on the restoration appeal will appear in future Newsletters.

The total number of readers taking part was 37 of whom 23 were Church members or local Christians, the remaining 13 were visitors who volunteered and felt it a privilege to read God's Word in our important and historic place of witness.

Although the primary purpose of the Bible reading was that of witness it was humbling to find that our little donation box raised £180 which has been donated to the Friends of Holy Rude to assist with the ongoing maintenance and running costs of Holy Rude.

It is hoped to complete the remaining Books of the New Testament when the 2020 season gets underway.

Grateful thanks to all who helped with this important act of Witness.

This Society was registered as a Charity (No. SC042326) in May 2011 with the main purpose of raising funds for the care and maintenance of Holy Rude. Other principal objectives are a) the adornment and furnishing of the Church and providing facilities for the benefit of the Congregation and visitors, b) supporting the performance of music in Holy Rude, and c) the encouragement of research into the history of the Church.

The current Financial Year of the Friends runs from 1st. April 2019 to 31st. March 2020.

Since being established in 2011, the Friends Society has now provided just over £250,000 of assistance for the care and maintenance of the historic Church of the Holy Rude.

<u>Ministry of Welcome Season 2019</u>

The end of season gathering of the volunteers was held in the church on 22nd. October, when the results were announced for the 2019 Ministry of Welcome Season that began on Good Friday 29th. April and ended on 5th. October. The first visitor on Good Friday was from Italy, and the last visitors of the season were a couple from California.

In total, a record number of 70,228 visitors from approx. 90 different countries were welcomed into Holy Rude during the 5 month opening period, This was the best ever year for Ministry of Welcome visitor numbers, beating the previous record of 2018 when 68,803 came to Holy Rude. Over the season, as part of our Outreach Service some 5,130 candles were lit in the St. Andrews Chapel and 726 Prayer Request Cards received. In addition, a reading of the complete Bible, starting from the Book of Genesis, was carried out. The shop also enjoyed a successful season with record sales. By the end of the season a total of just over £34,000 in donations was raised for the care and maintenance of our ancient and historic church.

The 28 Ministry of Welcome volunteers were thanked for their dedicated assistance in achieving such fantastic results.

<u> Talk on Stirling's History</u>

After the results for the season had been announced, an informative and entertaining talk was then given by the Stirling Council Archaeologist, Dr. Murray Cook, who provided stories from his excellent newly published book, *Digging Into Stirling's Past-Uncovering the Secrets of Scotland's Smallest City.*

Visitors Tales From Ministry of Welcome

Connal Family Connections

The stained glass windows on the west wall (Tower) of Holy Rude were installed in 1887-88 by William Connal, Merchant of Solsgirth, Dollar, to commemorate various members of his family. The large centre window, depicting *The Sermon On The Mount*, commemorates his son, Patrick, who died on 31st. July 1887, aged 30 years.

In May this year, a lady from New South Wales, Australia, visited Holy Rude, and left the comment in the Visitors Book "My Great Grandfather Robert Connal came to Australia, and was the son of Patrick."

Montana Visitors

Two related young girls from Montana were looking round the church, when one accidentally bumped into a lady who was part of another group of four older ladies (all 4 related). After exchanging apologies, they realised that they were both from the United States, and after further conversation that they were from Montana. Even more strangely, they then found out that they were fact distant relatives! The girls and older ladies then spent the next half hour swapping details and taking photographs.

Dividing Wall

After learning about the Dividing Wall in Holy Rude that existed from 1656 to 1936, one visitor from Northern Ireland advised of a similar situation existing in Belfast City Cemetery that was opened in the 1860's. Apparently there is a 9 feet high Dividing Wall in the cemetery, separating the Catholic burials from the Protestant ones. What is unusual about this wall is that it is built underground just below the surface! Details can be found on the Internet by searching *Belfast City Cemetery*.

Story behind the hymn

Phillip Brooks was a distinguished man of faith and intellect. A Boston-born Episcopalian preacher, he'd earned a Doctorate of Divinity from the University of Oxford, taught at Yale University, and publicly advocated against slavery during the Civil War. But he's best known for penning "O Little Town of Bethlehem" after a life-changing journey.

In 1865, Brooks rode on horseback from Jerusalem to Bethlehem, where he participated in the Church of the Nativity's five-hour long Christmas Eve celebration, complete with hymns. Returning home, this experience proved so profound that he channelled it into the hymn sung in churches to this day. Its first public performance was held three years later, performed by the children's choir of his church Church of the Holy Trinity, Philadelphia, on December 27. The music was written by his Organist, Lewis Redner.

Jesus is still the reason for the season



As this is the season of Advent, we decorate our homes and churches with holly, ivy and mistletoe; each has an interesting history.



Holly: The Romans gave sprigs of holly to their friends as presents during the feast of Saturnalia which falls in winter. Pliny the Elder, who was killed during the eruption of Vesuvius, wrote in his natural history that if a holly tree grew near a house it would deflect lightening and evil spirits. Holly was called 'holy tree' as the red berries were symbolic of Christ's blood and the thorns represented his suffering.



Ivy: Bacchus, who was the God of Wine, is represented with a wreath of ivy leaves around his head. This was supposed to ward off the effects of drinking too much wine. It was also reported to be a symbol of fertility and the Greeks gave a wreath of ivy when girls married. When ivy grows up a house, as it often does, many thought it would protect their home from evil



Mistletoe: Pliny, in his book of natural history, also wrote about the magical rites the druids performed. They thought mistletoe, which grew up the bark of mainly oak trees, was very potent and lovingly cut it with special sickles and caught it to stop it falling on the ground and getting damaged. Freya was the Norse goddess of love and was associated with fertility, which is probably why kissing under the mistletoe became a custom as she also protected mistletoe fiercely.
